April / May Dives

Sunday May 7. Neptune Rob Robison, former Neptunes Peter Ninh and Mike Vaughan, plus dive buddy Bonnie Zeller dove for scallops on Boston Scuba's Keepah in Boston Harbor on a clear but windy Sunday morning. Air temps were in the 60s while the bottom temp at 52' and 56' was a steady 46°F. The vis ranged from 5' to10' or so. We made a two-tank dive and Mike was clearly the winner scavenging in excess of 4lbs. of scallops on a day when we hit both sides of slack tide perfectly, so divers experienced virtually no current! Peter was diving again, finally, after a long recovery from having his eardrum surgically repaired. In addition to the scallops, Mike and Peter each found a keeper lobster, though Peter's escaped out of his bag while trying to stuff it with another scallop. Mike and I saw flounder and skate, and Mike also saw two ocean pouts. We all had a good day, though Peter fears he may have injured his other ear in the process. We will keep our fingers crossed for him on that one! **Sunday April 30.** Neptunes Chuck Zarba and Doug Eaton dove the Back River. Todd Alger dropped by to provide land-side support. Vis was reported to be less than 1ft. and the water was cold, according to informal reports. It was unclear what was found in the murk.

Sunday April 23: Neptunes Rob Vice, Chuck Zarba and Doug Eaton made a two-tank dive for scallops in Boston Harbor on Boston Scuba's Keepah. Doug says, "We caught about 3lbs each.We also found some old bottles. Water temp 45; depth 50 -60 ft.; vis. 5-15 ft. depending on current. The dive was at Peddocks Island. We all had a good day."

Also on the 23rd, Neptune Rob Robison and Bonnie Zeller returned to Hathaway Pond for a second pond dive. This time in addition to all the normal sites, Rob and Bonnie found the sunken cabin cruiser as well in the 42° water. Max depth was 41', vis around 10 - 15ft. Toward the end of our 30 minute dive we found a 2lb. Largemouth Bass staring at us, as we slowly ascended along the elongated rock pile leading up to the beach.

Making a splash! False killer whale puts on a spectacular show for group of stunned scuba divers

• A group of divers were treated to a rare sight while on a diving holiday in Tonga

The stunning underwater footage was taken by Australian diver Scott Portelli while on a trip to the Polynesian island of Tonga.

Portelli captured the video - which is believed to be a false killer whale, a type of dolphin - as the creature leaped around him and showed off its diving talent.



The stunned scuba diver posted the footage to Facebook after he travelled to Tonga on a diving expedition to look for humpback whales.

'Sometimes when you are looking for humpbacks, you find false killer whales instead,' Mr Portelli said. 'We had an unexpected encounter with a large pod of false killer whales. This one interactive one came back and literally jumped over one of my guests. Never know what you are going to see in Tonga.'

He added: 'This mother and calf False killer whale rolled around under us whistling and checking us out. Some beautiful encounters with some rarely seen cetaceans in Tonga.' False killer whales can grow to 17 feet, are black or dark grey in colour and generally do not resemble killer whales.

The dolphins were named as such because the marine animals sometimes attack small whales and dolphins.
