MARCH/APRIL CLUB ACTIVITIES & DIVES

Water temp 48°, depth 25', vis 15'. The weather was perfect. We found my lights that I lost last December (*Ed.Note*: Minor miracle!) in the dock area and some bottles. Chuck came up with some bottles, also, from the middle of the river. We ended the day at Emma's Café



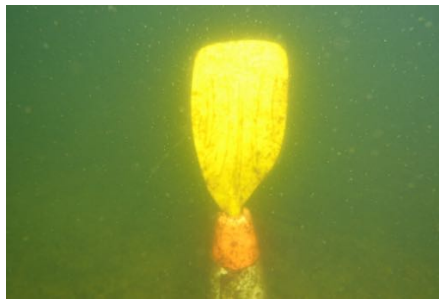

Morton's Pond, Plymouth, 3/30. *Story & photos by Rob.* I met up with Brian Smith, a local dive buddy in the Plymouth area, who has been recuperating from Lyme disease, frostbite, and a hernia operation since last August, and obviously has not gotten wet in that time frame. So you can imagine his joy to suit up once again, despite the tame dive location, in preparation for his return to the hydrosphere with yours truly or any other dive buddy, for that matter.



The pond had been stocked with trout, recently, and on either side of the small beach and swim area the banks were well-populated with expectant anglers. The weather was perfectly clear and sunshiny with air temps rising from the early morning 30s into the 60s over the course of the day. We took the path of least resistance and headed straight in. The water was clear in shallow, but as we dropped down to a max depth of 22,' it quickly deteriorated to about 10 murky feet and enveloped us in its 41°-42° embrace. Not a creature was stirring, not even a trout. If I understood fish logic, as explained by one of the fishermen in post-dive conversation, the trout had headed for the deeper dark recesses of the pond. Apparently, they

Sunday, March 31 at the Summer Street bridge, South Boston. Rob Vice and Todd Alger scouted the area around the Summer Street bridge, which is also near the North Channel in Boston Harbor, but did not return enthused about what they had seen or found underwater. Photos from their dive experience can be found on the club FaceBook Page and were taken by Todd Alger. Water temp was 39°F, with Rob reaching a depth of 15' and Todd a little over 20.'

As an added bonus, Todd Alger's more in depth article, complete with photos, just appeared in my Inbox:

This dive started a few months ago at one of our club meetings. I was talking to Billy Burchill and he gave us quite a few places for off-season diving. To me, one of the more intriguing sites was the B. bridge. In February, Doug Eaton, Rob Vice, and I decided to dive in Boston and scout some sites before deciding on where to go in. We did a quick scout on the Morrissey Ave bridge as we drove by. It looked like a two-car situation with one car parked on one side of the bridge and the other car parked on the other side of the bridge, because it did not look like crossing the road would be a good idea and the current probably would not allow a there and back dive. We also scouted the Summer St bridge. We found a good parking area at the Fed Ex building, and there was a little public park nearby on the water as well. We looked at diving the bridge and found a couple of difficult entry points; however, it looked like there was a strong outgoing current by the bridge, and we did not feel comfortable with being able to get back to our starting point if we dove the bridge. So on that day we dove the South Boston Yacht Club.

The second to last weekend in March, Chuck Zarba and I decided to give the Morrissey Ave bridge a try. We parked on the northern side of the bridge and discovered we could walk through the archway from one side to the other, so we could park on the northern side and be able to get back to our vehicle no matter what the tide was doing. We also thought it looked interesting and would give it a shot. However, as we started getting ready, I realized my BC was still in my garage at home. Chuck said, "How about you show me the Summer St bridge and then we go to breakfast instead of diving?" So off we went to scout Summer St and then breakfast. We did a thorough scout of the entire park area this time. We found that if we went to the very end of the park along the fence there seemed to be a good entry area, and away from the bridge there did not look to be much if any current that far from the bridge. We thought we could do this dive at this point without tide being an issue. Then, it was off to where we enjoyed a nice breakfast with very good pancakes.



The last Sunday of March, I was finally able to dive the Summer St bridge area. I would actually define it as the North Channel of Boston Harbor where we dove. My partner was Rob Vice. When we got there, we noticed a huge party had ensued, probably the night before, Saturday. There were many boxes of Bud Light and Twisted Tea with their empty cans and bottles all over the place. It was windy but warm and overcast with a forecast of rain later in the day. We first did the long carry of our rigs and weight harnesses to the entry

ramp we found on the beach and then went back to the parking lot to gear up in our dry suits. We were able to find a path to the water that was not too steep to climb down and the actual water entry was an easy walk in.

We began the dive and checked and found that there was little to no surface current and then we dropped down into about 10 feet of water that immediately sloped down to 15 feet. We swam straight out into the middle of the channel. However, we got separated from each other. Anytime one of us found an old can or bottle the bottom got very easily mucked up and everything behind us was a big cloud of dust, too. Rob got caught in the cloud and lost me, and he then surfaced to take his bearings. He decided



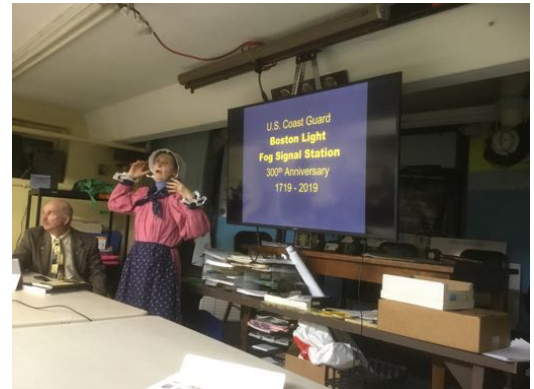
he'd have more luck under the floating boat docks, so he took a bearing on that and swam over there. Meanwhile, I just swam out to the middle and hunted around the mostly muddy bottom with a few rocks sprinkled around. After I got far enough away and cold enough, I turned around and swam back with nothing found worth putting in my bag. Rob had more luck under the docks. He found some tools and a fishing tackle box that contained lures and a fillet knife. All in all, I enjoyed our adventure into a new dive site where there is the potential of finding 400 year old artifacts. Bottom time: 30 min, Depth 20', Vis 5', Temp 39°F.

December 4, 1962 Newsletter (of the South Shore Neptunes)

December 4, 1962

The first meeting of the South Shore Neptunes in December was called to order by President Carter at 8:40 P.M. at the Boston Harbor Marina.

The Secretary's report was read and accepted.

The Treasury balance was \$660.02
