John Baldi - Largest Lobster

South Shore's own scuba pioneer won many "largest lobster" trophies in his day. John founded scuba clubs on the South Shore and opened his dive shop's storefront "South Shore Skindivers" in 1951 after first operating from his basement and working as a union bricklayer. John served in the US Navy in World War II and taught water survival. As a young man he raced bicycles, cross trained with speed skating and worked in Kraut's cycle shop in Quincy. He was known in the Scuba industry as "the Great John Baldi".

We dropped down immediately and began discovering interesting critters such as a very tiny baby crab alongside a Northern pipefish, a garden of Mermaid's Tresses chock full of tiny decorator crabs, lots of medium to very large Rock and Jonah crabs, some beautiful Spiral rock weed clusters and stalks, a juvenile Black Sea Bass, numerous juvenile Cunnners, and a whole lot more. Post-dive victuals and refreshment at Sandy's hit the spot.



I was up the next morning bright and early to meet Neptune Mike Whiteside at Hathaway's Pond. Given the conditions, we thought we would stick to the shallower area. As we explored, we came across a few new areas and found a StarTrek stormtrooper as well as the dual toilet thrones, and a bit more. As we

neared the entry/exit site, a dry-suited diver appeared out of the gloom. It was Bill Jeter, local savant of the pond and diving legend, making his routine pond reconnaissance dive.

After a day of rest, I met up with Neptune Mike O'Brien for an early morning dive on Sunday the 13th at Plymouth Long Beach. The tide was high, the water a bit clearer after a few more days of quietude, and had returned to 57°F. Sand lances were everywhere in the sand. Successfully photographing the Sea lance topped off a most pleasurable three-day dive sequence with three wonderful dive buddies. Thanks guys!! It really doesn't get any better than this: a little of the unexpected with each and every plunge, making each and every dive a true adventure.

August 16 - Peggotty Beach, Scituate, MA

A Grateful Experience by Wayne Ross

I would like to start off by saying thanks to the members of the Neptunes who made my dive last Sunday such a great success, the support from the club was touching. It was one of those days when everyone and everything came together for an outstanding event. It has been quite awhile since my last dive and decades since I last dove at Peggotty Beach in Scituate. You have no idea what the weather will be when you pick a date months in advance and as we all know living in New England there are no guarantees when it comes to storms in August. It was so nice to have such a beautiful summer day.

I reserved the beach wheelchair through the town's recreation department and the administrator gave me several parking passes. The amount of effort it takes to get me underwater is monumental. Most people have no idea how hard it is to roll a quadriplegic from side to side and pull on clothing. However, we all know how much effort it takes to put on a wetsuit...Well, putting a wetsuit on quadriplegic is tough. Ken Hayes and Michael Vaughan were sweating bullets after performing this task in my van. For some reason the booties wouldn't fit on my feet anymore so we improvised with shoes and socks. And, let me tell you, neoprene really works. When I felt my body, after the dive, I was relatively warm. However, my feet were freezing.

Onto the dive...just to get underwater is entering another world and that feeling the ocean gives you when you taste the salt and receive that hug as you descend is memorable. I saw a bunch of crabs, a small lobster and picked up a sea star along the way. The stats ~ water temperature 52 degrees, dive duration 34 minutes, max depth 19 feet. It brought back a lot of memories from when I was a kid growing up in Scituate. We went to Peggotty beach a lot and I remember snorkeling and later diving off that beach. I had forgotten how the terrain transitioned from seaweed, to a sandbar, to rocks, to another sandbar after which you will eventually encounter larger rocks with more places for lobsters. Like a lot of dives on the south shore you have to swim a long way out for any serious depth. We could have used one more diver in the water just for the flag. Both people helping me got tangled up in the line. Mr. Vaughan seems to have a knack for finding things and this dive was no different. He pocketed a kids dive mask and gave it away to a youngster on the beach.

I truly put my life in the hands of others when I scuba dive. Every able bodied individual has muscles for breathing and possess two sets of intercostal muscles: Internal intercostals that allow you to breath in and external intercostals that allow you to breath out. I have no external intercostals, so I cannot forcibly exhale which makes it impossible for me to clear a mask and I must use the water pressure to push air out of my lungs. If my head gets lower than my chest I can't breathe. I am also at a complete loss in the event of an emergency for I cannot dump the weights or pull my head out of the water at the surface. Needless to say, I have a lot of faith in my dive buddies. Everyone who showed up on Sunday contributed in one way or another.

Someone watched the parking lot, someone minded my wheelchair and moved it up onto the beach, one of the non-divers stayed in the water with me and put my mask on at the appropriate time. People helped me get the wetsuit off which was a heck of a lot easier than putting it on (we were in the beach wheelchair and it slides off when you are wet). The life guards helped with transfers from my wheelchair to the beach wheelchair and back. The only thing missing was a photographer, plenty of people were taking photos of us on the beach for we were quite the spectacle, yet I forgot to get my phone and have someone snap images.

Ken and Mike did the lion's share of the work providing all the gear and swimming me around underwater. However, I appreciate everyone who made this possible. I look forward to next year.
