



RECORD OF THE PAST MONTH

EVENTS OF THE COMING MONTH

The bis event for February will be the ice dive, to be held at Fuller's Quarry in Quincy on Sunday, February 15. The dive will begin at 10:00 AM and continue until all divers present have been in the water. We shall make two holes in the ice to speed thinds up. Please try to be on time, but if you are a bit late the dive will still be in progress. Preparations will begin at 8:00 AM and we need as many people as possible at that time to help cut holes, clear the ice, and set up the canopy. There will be food for sale at the site, thanks to Joel, Jeff, and helpers.

As usuall we are inviting all other clubs in the area and all other divers to participate in our annual ice dive. Therefore all divers who read this newsletter please consider this an invitation. If you have never been under the ice, it is an experience you won't want to miss. We pay very careful attention to safety, and it is not nearly as cold as you would think. If you have been in the ocean in these parts in June: it is no colder than that. In addition there will be a truck with a heater in which divers can change. Anyone who has any doubts about the weather should call John Blackadar at 1-826-2505. (Hanover) If there is no enswer on the morning of the dive it means that John is at

the dive site and that the dive is on. If there is a bis snow storm a day or two before the dive, it may not be possible to get the road plowed, so that would be the time to call.


Paul Adler has announced that East Coast Divers will be opening a new store in Framingham about March 9. The event will be celebrated by sales at both stores during the last full week of March.

EVENTS OF THE COMING MONTH

Sharon has always been very good to us in letting us use the lake. To reach Lake Massapoag take route 128 to route 138 and turn south toward

Stoughton. Turn right at the traffic light at the foot of the hill (about 0.8 ml.) onto Washington St. Follow Washington St. through the center of Canton to Cobb's Corner (gas stations, shopping center, Star Market), a distance of about 5 mi. At Cobb's Corner turn right and take route 27 to the center of Sharon (about 2 mi.) where route 27 turns right. Turn left and then immediately right onto Pond St. Follow Pond St. to the lake (just less than one mile). The dive will be at the near end of the lake. An alternate route is to take 195 south from route 128 about 5 mi. to exit 10. Turn left on Coney St. and then take Coney St. and route 27 into Sharon center, about 2.8 mi. Cross Main St. and then immediately turn right onto Pond St.

On May 31 we shall have the first wreck dive of the year. This will be the point dive for May. We shall be diving on a wreck off Spectacle Island and leaving form Pemberton Pier at the end of the Hull Peninsula. The exact time is still to be arranged and will be announced at the May meetings. Those who are unable to make the meetings call the president and ask. If there are doubts about the weather come anyway; a decision to cancel will only be made at the last minute. If you are really in doubt, call the president (826-2505) and ask.

The social get together on May 9 had to be cancelled because of booking problems. We shall try again next month.

REMINDERS

Bob Murphy has two charter dates for wreck dives: Sunday July 19, and Sunday August 2. On each of these dates dives will be made on either the Pinthis, and oil tanker, or the Mars, an ocean going tug. Two dives (on the same wreck) are planned for each of the days. Both wrecks are in about 100 ft. of water, and there will therefore be some special equipment requirements; talk to Bob for details. Six divers can be accommodated and Bob is taking reservations on a frist come, first served basis. The cost will be \$30.00, payable when the reservation is made. If there is sufficient interest, Bob can probably get additional dates.

TIDES AND THE MOON

Spring tides (higher than average highs and lower than average lows) occurr at the new moon and full moon, while neap tides (less than average) occurr at the quarters. In addition, tides are greater when the moon is closest to the earth (perigee) and less when the moon is farthest from the earth (apogee). When the moon is in the plane of the earth's orbit around the sun (the ecliptic) the day and night highs tend to be the same height, but they tend to be different when the moon is either north or south of the ecliptic. The moon passes through the ecliptic twice each month. The new moon of 2 June follows the perigee by only one day, so the tides will be unusually high at that time. The upper left corner of each date square on your callendar contains the time of the first high tide at Boston on that day. The next high tide will be, on the average, 12 hr. 24 min. later.







NOTES ON DECOMPRESSION SICKNESS

Most of us seem to think that the U.S. Navy decompression tables are infallible. They certainly are the best we have, but they are far from infallible. Producing accurate tables requires a very large amount of data, and in this case data are cases of the "bends". A lot of guesswork is involved in all the tables, and the exceptional and extreme exposure tables are almost completely guesswork. In addition, susceptibility varies from one individual to another and from day to day for the same individual, and for reasons that are not completely understood. We know that we can always ascend from 33 ft. (27 ft. for saturation diving), and this indicates that it must be difficult to get the bubbles started. Surface tension theory explains the difficulty, but then does not explain how he bubbles ever get started at all. Recent research suggests that one of the substances in the blood which helps the blood to clot also has the effect of promoting the formation of "bends" bubbles. Deep diving whales lack this substance, and although they seem not to be subject to decompression sickness, they bleed to death very easily.

The human body has the capacity to produce substances which it requires, and it therefore probable that after an injury which causes bleeding, the body would contain larger than normal amounts of clotting agents and therefore be more susceptible to decompression sickness. Common sense therefore indicates that after any severe injury (cut, bruise, sprain, muscle pull, etc.) a diver use a great deal of extra caution to avoid "bends".



foundest sympathies.



CAUSES OF DIVER FATALITIES 1976, 1977, 1978


Below is a list of the starting causes of nonprofessional underwater diving fatalities for the years 1976, 1977, and 1978. The list was compiled by NUADC and published in the September, 1981 issue of <u>Undercurrent</u>. It should be born in mind that these are starting causes and other factors usually become involved later. It is also obvious that the categories must overlap somewhat. Air embolism, exhaustion, and panic continue to be the most frequent culprits, but running out of air, see conditions, and heart attack are also significant. Cold is not listed as a frequent cause, but it is obviously a major contributor to exhaustion.
