
You are all invited to a cocktail party at the Gerhard's at 38 Spring Lane, Canton at 5:30 PM on February 13, just before the Banquet.

From the East take Route 128 to Route 138 and head south (toward Stoughton). After 3/4 mile there will be a traffic light at the foot of the hill. Turn right onto Washington St. After two miles turn right onto Chapman St. Chapman St. is 200 yards beyond the first traffic light. The corner is marked by Temple Beth Abraham on the left and the L'il White Store on the right. Travel ½ mile on Chapman and then turn right onto Spring Lane. Look for the second house on the left, a white shingle house behind overgrown hemlock trees. Park in the driveway (starts just beyond end of neighbor's chain link fence under first street light) while there is still room; the street is narrow.

THE CATHEDRAL ROCKS DIVE, on Feb. 7, was well attended. The weather was bright, clear, and cold, while the ocean itself was also very calm, very clear, and very cold. A few lobsters were taken although the most common animals were sea urchins on the bottom, and small transparent sea creatures called larvaceans in the water column. This creature is a tiny tadpoleelike animal living inside a walnut-shaped gelatinous "house", which it uses to filter for microscopic plants. Larvaceans are closely related to sea squirts and thus distantly related to us vertebrates. As they are found in such blooms as in this dive only during certain times of the year, we witnessed a rare event.

The ANNUAL CLUB BANQUET, held this year at Lantana's in Randolph, went off extremely well. Over a hundred members, guests, and ex-members attended, more than originally anticipated. Several ex-members had such a good time, they decided they wanted to rejoin. Immediately preceding the Banquet Bruce and Sylvia Gerhardhosted a cocktail party in their warm and open home. Their hospitality no doubt helped set the mood which produced a very successful evening.

The ANNUAL ICE DIVE was also well attended, despite poor weather. Approximately sixty-four divers went through the ice and indulged in such activities as car salvage and walking upside-down on the ice. Once again, our special team of seminaked swimmers went into the water wearing only their trunks. Team leader Jim Walker showed his mettle (and most of his epidermis) by going in first; Steve Norris and Erian Clinton followed, showing to what lengths they'll go to get their names in this newsletter!

Both of the February meetings had SPECIAL SLIDE SHOWS. At the first meeting Bob Michelson showed action shots of the January Underwater Competition in Connecticutt. At the second meeting, Bill Carter gave a very well-prepared slide show on wreck diving. The show covered all aspects of wreck diving from researching and finding the wreck to preparing and preserving the relicts.

GET TOGETHER DIVE will be at Strawberry Point, Scituate, on March 28th. Strawberry Point, or The Glades, is the private estate just beyond the beach where we often dive and is open by special invitation to the club. Strawberry Point contains summer homes for the Adamses and several other old Yankee families and is reputedly the point of release for the state's lobster stock. 






FIGURE 284.—Goosefish (Lophius americanus), oblique-dorsal view, Gulf of Maine specimen. From Bigelow and Welsh.




FIGURE 239.—Lumpfish (Cyclopterus lumpus), Eastport, Maine. From Goode. Drawing by H. L. Todd.




FIGURE 155.—Hogchoker (Achirus fasciatus), Woods Hole. After Jordan and Evermann. Original drawing by




FIGURE 209.—Striped bass (Roccus saxatilis), Chesapeake Bay region. From Goode. Drawing by H. L. Todd.

Underwater Junkyard

New York Police Divers Find Their Beat Littered With Everything From Guns to Planes and Autos

NEW YORK—As the rain slackens, two men dive into the murky waters of the Hudson River. They are after murder evidence: The body of a small-time hood, wrapped in a 20-foot chain, was recently fished out of the water near this spot.

Within minutes, the divers surface with their catch: a holster, a man's shirt, a set of car keys. Dark-suited detectives, expressionless behind sunglasses, spirit the goods

away to a crime laboratory.

While other officers pound this city's sidewalks or cruise its streets in squad cars, the 13 scuba divers on the police department's Underwater Recovery Team patrol its polluted waters. Their beat includes some 700 miles of shoreline in and around New York's five boroughs. The rivers, bays, marshes and drainage pipes in this underwater domain are as teeming, various and unpredictable as any of the city's streets or sidewalks.

"There is one of everything" down below, says Charles O'Donnell, who after 13 years of diving recently transferred to the narcotics unit. "If it's on land, it is—or has been or

will end up-in the water."

Over the years, police divers have retrieved lost helicopters and false teeth, museum artifacts and electronic equipment, religious relics and stolen musical instruments. Most of the time, however, they hunt for corpses and guns in water thick with raw sewage. And as police work goes, it's a coveted assignment. "No matter what I'm doing, as long as I'm in the water, it's a pleasure," says diver Joseph Lutsky, who, like others in the unit, dives about 20 times a week year-round.

Planes and Keys

The search for one helicopter, lost in the East River about 400 yards off Wall Street, took 10 days. Yet the unit managed to find a tiny key to a bus-terminal locker after only three days of combing a 10,000-square-foot area of the Harlem River. (An informer had tipped police as to the key's whereabouts; it was needed as evidence in a bombing case.)

While diving in the East River for another missing helicopter, the unit turned up two fixed-wing airplanes positioned end to end. One, it turned out, was a private plane abandoned by its owner in order to collect the insurance. The other was a U.S. fighter plane that had gone down during World War II

Plunging to depths as great as 125 feet, the divers prowl an underwater junkyard. One got a start when he once found himself trapped inside an abandoned Barnum & Bailey circus cage. Others have snaked their way through millions of feet of movie film piled on the bottom of the East River (dumped there illegally, officers speculate, because it was cheaper than carting it off). Once, while diving in a specific spot for a specific pistol, a diver found no fewer than 27 guns thrown in by as many separate owners. An officer says that a diver descending "at any given point" in New York waters may be greeted by auto graveyards 50 to 75 cars deep.

Traces of the macabre aren't unusual. One diver brought up a bottle containing a human heart studded with pins; it was eventually traced to a medical school. Officer William Reddan, who with 17 years of diving to his credit is the senior member of the team, says voodoo curses are quite common. He reels off the contents of these death spells in a jar: "several lemons, a picture of the person or a strand of his hair and a note" spelling out the curse. The contents of the jar are thoroughly soaked in urine, he adds.

Blind Searches

Picking their way through this flotsam and jetsam is tricky, for visibility is almost nil at many spots beneath the surface, particularly in the highly polluted Harlem and Hudson rivers. On a recent Hudson dive, the officers were jubilant because they could see nearly two feet. (By contrast, in Jamaica Bay and other swimming areas within the unit's territory, visibility is 25 feet or more.)

In Newtown Creek, a waterway dividing Brooklyn and Queens, petrochemicals have taken their toll. "The water is dead, not even plankton," observes Mr. O'Donnell. "The water is so stagnant, it's like diving in Jell-O. You feel like you want to cut a hole in it and dive down that way."

In zero-visibility water, the police divers search by slithering along the bottom on their bellies, often with eyes closed, groping for an object with their hands. One officer engaged in this sort of blind search for a gun was unnerved to find himself in the embrace of a dead woman whose arms had floated upward, hooplike, above her body.

The pollution that impedes visibility has also been blamed for a sudden outbreak of parasitic disease among police- and fire-department divers. Early in August, six members of the police unit and nine fire-department divers contracted parasitic infections known to be transmitted by contact with sewage. (With an estimated 143 million gallons of untreated sewage dumped every day into the Hudson alone, the divers have plenty of contact with sewage.)

Two of the officers were infected with amebiasis, a strain that thrives in the tropics but "is about as common in New York as tigers in the middle of the street," according to one doctor. Amebiasis caused the death of

a New York City sewage-treatment worker last January. The divers, who were less seriously ill, have all recovered.

Members of the unit, who may spend as much as an hour each day washing in industrial-strength laundry detergent, point out that this is the first outbreak of disease in the unit's 17-year history. After completion of a city health-department investigation of the epidemic, the unit will decide whether the watertight "dry" suits and protective masks that are now worn in winter should become standard year-round equipment.

Disease is but one of the hazards the divers face on the job. They must dodge unseen dangers below, such as rusty shopping carts, cables and metal rods that can ensnare them or tear at their suits and skin. And powerful currents make swimming treacherous.

"It's a hostile environment," Mr. Reddan says. "It takes a certain mental balance and lots of training."

The hazards, along with highly publicized feats like its rescue a few years ago of four men trapped in an overturned tugboat, have served to burnish the unit's image with the public, and with recruits eager to serve in an elite corps.

It doesn't take long, however, for the illusion of glamour to vanish into the tainted waters of the Hudson. "A lot of fellows envision this as really great," Mr. O'Donnell says, "but then they get here and they find that—you know, they're not diving in the Caribbean, they're not getting paid extra for it, and they're exposing themselves to danger."

Worn, inadequate equipment and the requirement that the divers do routine repairs on the police boats are frequent complaints. Officers say that although their \$600 diving suits begin to leak after six months, they are replaced only every two years. (The unit's size nearly tripled in January—to 13 from five—but its annual equipment budget was trimmed to \$3,000 from \$5,000.)

"It seemed more glamorous than it is," says one disillusioned recruit.

Yet despite the grumbling, the lure of the water—and the unexpected—still prevails. "It never really gets boring," Mr. O'Donnell says. "Every time you go down, you see something different."


